Family Gatherings Space

These clients came to us for the same reason most of our clients do: the space they had in their house just didn't work.

Their laundry room, kitchen, and living rooms we right on top of each other, and they wanted something more functional now that their kids were grown. Soon, they would be hosting large family gatherings, complete with grandchildren, and they needed a kitchen and living area that could handle it.

The Design

First, we moved her laundry room to its own separate area. This not only sequestered the laundry room away from the living space, but it also allowed us to open up the kitchen and allow more pantry space.

This change gave our clients more room for storage, more entertaining space, and more counter space. We used bright white cabinets with a matching backsplash and countertops, which make the kitchen look open and inviting.

Next, we removed the small kitchen island, which was just not functional. We replaced it with a peninsula which makes entertaining easier and allows for more storage space.

In the living room, we added a fresh coat of paint, removed the old carpeting, and continued the flooring from the kitchen to give the space a more cohesive look. We also added built-in shelving and cabinets, which our clients absolutely love!

We made sure to add some modern touches, like the light fixture above the peninsula and the bronze door pulls on the cabinets. Overall, the remodel made our client's home more functional and cohesive.

Project Highlights

Our clients start every day with a cup of coffee, so they wanted a coffee maker that was easy to access but did not take up counter space.

We included a separate coffee bar in the open space between the peninsula and the wall to set up their coffee maker without losing counter space in the rest of the kitchen.

It was a difficult decision to remove the island and replace it with a peninsula. By installing a peninsula, we could create more storage space for our clients.





No cabinet is wasted – they put Christmas decorations underneath the bar in the corner, silverware and serving utensils go in the peninsula drawers, and so forth. The peninsula also joins the living room space and the kitchen together, so it's much easier for the family to interact with each other.

Collaborative Process

The client really wanted an island. Try as we might, there simply wasn't a good way to include one without sacrificing space and functionality.

So we listened to them, and discussed how they wanted the space to work, as well as how they wanted to look. That allowed us to present a solution that met their needs and offered the best possible design.
